Although these are vegetables that like hot weather, always be mindful to give extra care to watering especially during extreme temperatures as young transplants are still very tender and fragile while they are getting established.

Spring tomatoes need to be planted early so you can get them to bloom and fruit before the heat of summer rolls in and shuts fruiting down. Keep frost protection nearby to protect in case of a late errant freeze.

Late summer/very early fall (mid to late August), you can put in a second round of these spring veggies (tomatoes, peppers, eggplant, etc...), if you plant them early enough so they can fruit before the first freeze arrives.

In order to be able to achieve a harvest on these warm weather vegetables before the cold weather and frost arrives, you should plant them as early in fall as you can (or late summer).

Temperatures are generally still very hot during this time, so you must take care to offer some protection from the sun during the hottest times of the day and until young, tender transplants become established.
